Language learning apps, online exercises, and interactive platforms now offer students additional opportunities to practice grammar outside of the classroom, often providing instant feedback and personalized learning experiences. These tools complement traditional and communicative methods, allowing for a more engaging and dynamic learning process. The question of how to balance explicit grammar instruction with communicative practice remains central to language teaching. While learners need to understand grammatical rules, they must also be able to apply them fluently in conversation. The evaluation of various grammar teaching methods revealed both strengths and limitations in traditional and modern approaches. By examining the effectiveness of each method, we can understand how best to integrate them for optimal grammar instruction.

Results

Traditional Methods:

Grammar-Translation Method and Audiolingual Method resulted in improved grammatical accuracy among students. Learners demonstrated a solid understanding of explicit rules and were able to apply them correctly in written tasks.

"However, these methods showed limited effectiveness in promoting fluency and spontaneous communication. Students often struggled to use grammar in real-life contexts, focusing more on rote memorization than practical language application". 8

Deductive approaches (explicit teaching of rules) enabled students to quickly grasp grammatical structures but often led to passive learning, with limited engagement or critical thinking involved.

Modern Methods:

"Communicative Language Teaching and Task-Based Language Teaching yielded better results in terms of fluency and the practical application of grammar. Students engaged more in communicative activities, making fewer grammatical errors in speech and writing".

However, learners occasionally exhibited less accuracy in complex grammatical structures due to the lesser emphasis on explicit instruction. Despite this, students showed increased confidence in using grammar within communicative contexts.

Inductive approaches (students discovering grammar rules from examples) fostered a deeper understanding and retention of grammatical structures. Students were more engaged and developed critical thinking skills, although the process required more time compared to deductive teaching.

Discussion

The findings suggest that a balanced approach, integrating both traditional and modern methods, is essential for effective grammar teaching.

Traditional vs. Modern Methods: Traditional methods excel in ensuring grammatical accuracy, which is important for students aiming to master the rules of language. However, their limitation lies in their inability to encourage practical use of grammar in dynamic, real-life contexts. This is where modern methods, particularly CLT and TBLT, prove more effective, as they focus on communicative competence and task completion in realistic scenarios. Although students might make occasional errors, they are more likely to use the language fluidly. To address the weaknesses of both approaches, combining explicit rule teaching (traditional) with communicative practice (modern)

These tools promote active learning, allowing students to track their progress and practice grammar at their own pace. However, relying too heavily on technology without adequate classroom interaction can limit deeper understanding. Therefore, technology should complement-not replace-traditional classroom teaching.

"Blended Learning: The success of blended learning models highlights the importance of integrating different methods. In a blended environment, students receive the benefits of explicit grammar instruction, combined with the flexibility and interactivity of digital tools. This approach helps cater to diverse learning styles, offering structured guidance alongside opportunities for self-directed practice. It also enables teachers to provide targeted feedback, while allowing students to take ownership of their learning". ¹⁰

Student-Centered Approaches: Inductive methods, where students derive rules from examples, encourage critical thinking and greater retention of grammatical structures. While more time-consuming, they promote active engagement and foster a deeper understanding of grammar. Teachers should consider incorporating inductive approaches in a way that challenges students while ensuring sufficient guidance when necessary.

The results of this study underscore the importance of combining traditional and modern grammar teaching methods to achieve the best learning outcomes. Traditional approaches provide the necessary foundation for grammatical accuracy, while modern methods promote practical communication and fluency. By integrating technology and adopting blended learning models, teachers can create a more dynamic, interactive, and student-centered approach to grammar instruction. A balance between explicit rule-based teaching and communicative practice will ensure that learners not only understand grammar rules but can also apply them effectively in real-world scenarios.

Conclusion

In conclusion, the effectiveness of grammatical teaching methods is significantly influenced by the integration of both traditional and modern approaches. Traditional methods, such as the Grammar-Translation Method and Audiolingual Method, provide a strong foundation in grammatical rules but often lack the ability to facilitate real-life language use.
