Challenges Identified in Previous Research:

Communication Barriers:

Barrier to communication includes Physical, Cultural, Linguistic, Interpersonal and Organizational.

• Physical barriers that are external to both speaker as well receiver which interferes with the physical transmissions of the encoded message made by the speaker. Distance also plays a very important role in communication. Long distance creates the communication barrier. Physical barriers are structural obstacles in natural or manmade environments that prevent or block mobility or access.

Examples of physical barriers in communication:

- Noise

- Technical difficulties, etc.
- Cultural barrier shows that diversity in culture makes communication difficult as the mindset of people of different cultures are different, the language, signs and symbols are also different. Different cultures have different meaning of words, behaviors and gestures. The main cross-cultural barriers are ethnocentrism, stereotyping, psychological, language, geographical distance, and conflicting values.

Cultural Barriers examples:

- Social customs

- Religious and Spiritual Beliefs
- Values and Beliefs, and etc.
- Linguistic barriers express that individual linguistic ability may sometimes become a barrier to communication. The use of difficult or inappropriate words in communication can prevent the people from understanding the message. Language Barriers of communication examples:
 - Accents and Pronunciation
 - Jargon and Technical Terms
 - Limited Vocabulary
 - Cultural Idioms and Expressions.
- Interpersonal barriers stem from an individual's attitude or habits whereas Interpersonal barriers occur due to inappropriate transaction of words between two or more people. It shows that barriers to interpersonal arises when sender's message is received



differently from how it was intended. It's of no use to communicate with someone when he is not interested in it. It includes lack of trust in employee, lack of knowledge of non-verbal clues like facial expression, body language, gestures, postures, eye-contact, different experiences, shortage of time for employees, lack of Motivation, lack of cooperation, trust, fear of penalty and poor relationship with the employer.

• Organizational structure greatly affects the capability of the employees as far as the communication is concerned. The barriers that generate form within the organization are known as organizational barriers. They can be: information overload, poor planning, complex structure, status difference. Timing, and lack of feedback. Those barriers occur in the organization due to rules, regulation and hierarchical relationship.

Research shows that students, particularly non-native speakers, often face difficulties in verbal communication, which can hinder group dynamics and learning outcomes (Smith, 2018).

Three mental barriers:

- Self-doubt and negative thinking. We all have a doubting mind from time to time.
- Fear. We all experience fear from time to time: fear of the unknown, of failing, of not being good enough.
- Discomfort. Most of us have established a "comfort zone," where we feel safe, secure, and confident.

Unequal Participation:

Unequal participation poses a challenge to collaborative learning because it reduces opportunities for fruitful collaboration among learners and affects learners' satisfaction. Social group awareness tools can display information on the distribution of participation and thus encourage groups to regulate the distribution of participation. However, some groups might require additional explicit support to leverage the information from such a tool. Therefore, this study investigated the effect of combining a group awareness tool and adaptive collaboration prompts on the distribution of participation during web-based collaboration.

Several studies have pointed out that group members may not equally contribute, leading to disengagement and reduced learning outcomes (Jones Clark, 2020).
