A diphthong is a complex vowel sound that begins with one vowel sound and glides into another within the same syllable (e.g., the sound /ai/ in "ride"). A triphthong consists of three vowel sounds combined (e.g., the sound /avə/ in "our"). These sounds are often









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unfamiliar to speakers of languages that do not use such combinations, adding another layer of difficulty in mastering English pronunciation.

4. Pronunciation of Sounds with the Tongue

Many English sounds require specific tongue positions for accurate pronunciation. For example, the $/\theta$ / sound in "think" involves placing the tongue between the teeth, while the /r/ sound requires the tongue to be curled in the mouth. The need to master these intricate tongue movements presents a unique challenge for learners, especially for those whose native languages do not feature similar sounds or articulation patterns.

5.Two Letters Representing One Sound

Another feature of English pronunciation is the use of letter combinations to represent a single sound.
