A STUDY OF PHONOLOGICAL DEVICES IN ENGLISH DISCOURSE

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**Annotatsiya.** *Ushbu maqolada ingliz diskursida qo'llaniladigan fonologik vositalarning funksional va pragmatik xususiyatlari tahlil qilinadi. Tadqiqot fonologik birliklarning, xususan alliteratsiya, assonans, konsonans, ritm, urg'u va intonatsiya kabi vositalarning nutqning mazmuniy va emotsional ta'sirini kuchaytirishdagi rolini o'rganishga qaratilgan. They influence interpretation, highlight key information, and guide the listener's emotional response. These devices are especially noticeable in literary works, political speeches, advertising texts, and media discourse, where sound patterns are deliberately used to strengthen persuasion and memorability. Modern linguistic research increasingly recognizes that discourse analysis cannot be limited to grammar and vocabulary alone. Sound patterns actively participate in meaning-making processes. For instance, repetition of consonant sounds (alliteration) may create emphasis and cohesion, while intonation patterns may signal irony, doubt, certainty, or emotional intensity. In spoken discourse, stress placement can completely alter pragmatic meaning, even when lexical items remain unchanged.

Phonology as a Structural level in Linguistics Despite the important consideration that has been given to phonology as a structural level of linguistics, perhaps not always enough has been made with regard to its discourse-level relevance. Most classic research tends to treat linguistic phonological facts as if they were somehow delinked from communicative intention. Yet, theoretical developments in the area of pragmatics and discourse analysis postulate that phonological variation is seldom arbitrary. So sound choice supports the situation described in the text. Rhythm is another important element. English speech normally follows a pattern where stressed syllables appear regularly. Good speakers use rhythm to control attention. If a sentence is too long without pauses, it becomes difficult to follow. But when ideas are divided clearly and key words are stressed, the message becomes clearer. In political speeches, repetition of similar sentence structures often creates emotional effect and encourages the audience. Intonation is especially important in spoken discourse. The same words can express different meanings depending on tone. For example, the sentence “You finished it.” can sound like praise, surprise, or even doubt. Everything depends on voice movement. Rising tone may show uncertainty, while falling tone usually expresses confidence. Because of this, intonation helps listeners understand hidden meaning. Stress placement also changes focus. In English, speakers stress the most important word in a sentence. If someone says, “I wanted the BLUE dress,” the color becomes the main information. If the stress is on “I,” it may show contrast with another person. In this way, stress organizes information inside discourse. In literary texts phonological devices are used more creatively<sup>44</sup>. Writers sometimes choose words not only for their meaning but also for how they sound together. Soft sounds may describe peaceful nature, while harsh sounds may describe conflict. Even without directly saying that something is frightening, sound patterns can create that feeling.

In everyday conversations people do not think about phonological devices consciously, but they still use them naturally. When someone becomes emotional, their intonation changes. When they want to emphasize something, they raise their voice or
