Conclusion:

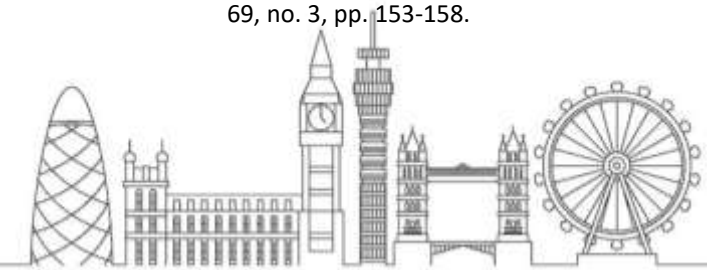
